




Rave or Party Drugs

- Started in England in 1980's
- All night dance party
- Loud rapid tempo dance music
- Laser and light shows
- Smoke and fog
- Psychedelic screen images




Gamma-Hydroxybutyrate

- Known as GHB
- Central nervous system depressant
- Banned by FDA in 1990
- Developed 30 years ago as an anesthetic
- Growth hormone stimulant



GHB Home Lab

- Gamma Butyrolactone
- Sodium Hydroxide
- Potassium Hydroxide
- Table Acid (lemon juice)



How Does It Affect a Person?

- Happy & mellow
- Euphoric intoxication
- Aphrodisiac
- Drowsiness
- Dizziness
- Visual disturbance



High Dose

- Loss of consciousness
- Respiratory depression
- Seizures
- Vitals lowered
- Pupils slow to react
- Horizontal and vertical gaze nystagmus will be present



Ketamine

- Pharmaceutical drug
- Anesthetic for humans and veterinary
- Generally stolen not manufactured
- Cost about \$20 per hit
- Smoked, injected, or put in drinks






Physical Effects

- Last 1 - 2 hours
- Effects similar to LSD or PCP
- K - Land - mellow
- K Hole - Out of Body Experience



Nitrous Oxide

- Aesthetic gas used by dentist
- Usually stolen
- Sold in balloons \$3 - \$5
- Effects last 30 seconds to 5 minutes



MDMA Ecstasy

- Most popular “club drug”
- Synthetic psychoactive stimulant
- Effects last 4-6 hrs.
- Remains in blood stream 36 - 48 hrs.



Physical Effects

- Rapid heart beat
- Continuous talking
- High body temps
- Muscle cramping
- Reduced inhibitions



Jaw Muscle Tension

- Grinding of teeth
- Often uses pacifiers



YABA

- “Crazy Medicine” in Thai and “Nazi Speed”
- Methamphetamine and caffeine
- Tablets taken orally, crushed and snorted, or heated on tin foil and vapors inhaled



DMT

Dimethyltryptamine “Dreamster”

- Schedule 1 Hallucinogen, non-narcotic and non-euphoric
- Mimosa hostilis bark
- Lye, Naptha, ammonia
- Crystals smoked, snorted or injected



5-MeO-DMT

- Psychedelic tryptamine
- Sonoran Desert Toad venom
 - “Licking the Toad” and Church of the Toad of Light
- Ingestion not preferred, smoke or inject



K2 or Spice

- Spice, Genie, incense, potpourri, JWH018
- Sold in head shops for years, only recently made illegal in AL along with Salvia. Many kids not yet aware.
- Name from K2, 2nd highest mountain on Earth but with reputation of being the “Finest” mountain on Earth.
- Effects similar to MJ. Affinity for Cannabanoïd receptors in brain.

Salvinorin – Active Ingredient


Effects
