


## History Repeats

# Who is Responding? The Ecosystem of Disaster Response

- Government
- Police, Fire, EMS
- Union & Non Union Workers
- Day Laborers
- Institutional NGO's VOAD
- Community Based Groups
- Survivor Volunteers
- Emergent Volunteers aka Spontaneous Colleges
- Groups etc.

The increase in frequency and intensity of severe storms that bring the threat of flooding, and corresponding hazards.

What differs is the exposure to those hazards and the resources professional responders, disaster workers and volunteers have to mitigate their impact, and that varies greatly



- No services or insurance




#### Addressing Challenges

# The First Collaborative Disaster Volunteer Credential




Collaboration is about working with others to produce something together and achieve shared goals.

A true collaboration and partner-based credentialing program assists leaders & managers by reducing their training burden, while ensuring disaster volunteers gain skills & safety knowledge.


The common curricula & coordination tools housed on an interactive portal, facilitates cooperative disaster response & protecting our responders.
